### **WHY A DISTRICT?**

In the summer of 1980, there were 55 Leather & LGBTQ businesses, clubs and nightlife venues in the South of Market area (SOMA). We now count 13. It is our objective to protect existing bars, clubs, businesses, and institutions, and encourage new ones to open here. At the same time, it is essential to increase affordable housing in the neighborhood and make sure our community is heard in the City's zoning, transit, and land use decisions.

We plan to work with the City, developers, and others to promote features that honor the people, places and institutions which gave SOMA its uniquely sexy, fun culture. This will help cement the character of the area and make it a destination which will attract tourists and locals to shop and recreate here, supporting the existing businesses, bars and clubs. We will also work to connect businesses and at-risk residents with city programs that will help them remain in the area.

In the long term we will work toward establishing a Leather and LGBTQ Cultural Center in a permanent location to ensure that our vital community groups have a place to meet.

#### **WHY HERE?**

In the 1960's, SOMA became the leather crossroads of the world. By day, SOMA was a gritty neighborhood of factories, warehouses, and working class housing. After dark, Folsom Street and its nearby alleys came alive with leather bars, sex clubs, bathhouses, and the motorcycles of the leatherpeople who made Folsom Street their physical, spiritual, and sexual home.

In the 1980's, AIDS devastated the LGBTQ community, and new laws restricting sexual freedom also took a toll on SOMA. The AIDS crisis devastated our community, but also taught leatherfolk how to care for one another, and how

to enjoy their sexuality with respect and responsibility.

Starting in the 1990's, the housing boom and its resulting gentrification increasingly displaced community groups, artists, writers, leatherfolk, as well as bars, sex clubs, galleries, publishers, leather and kink artisans and other businesses. Clubs and organizations lost the spaces they needed to provide support, education and safety information to the city's kinky, Leather, and LGBTQ individuals and to hold meetings, play parties and other events. Today these and other societal pressures threaten leather culture itself.

#### **WHAT NOW?**

We realized the need for unity in our diversity, and we found it in the Leather & LGBTQ Cultural District.

Leather culture in SOMA may be threatened, but its heart still beats strong. The Folsom Street Fair brings thousands to the city each year, the remaining bars on Folsom and Harrison pulse with sexual energy, and the kinkiness makes this area a world renown destination.

Today, the Leather and LGBTQ Cultural District focuses on preserving and strengthening this unique hub of thought and action.




